
## The Early Days of Open

- Open Educational Resources (OER) was coined at UNESCO's 2002 Forum on Open Courseware
- MIT Open CourseWare (OCW) was launched in 2001 and adopted the newly created <u>Creative Commons licensing</u> in the following year.
- The <u>Cape Town Open Education Declaration</u> was released on 22 January 2008, urging governments and publishers to make publicly funded educational materials available at no charge via the internet.
- 1st World OER Congress in Paris in 2012 resulted in the <u>Paris Declaration</u>.
- Most recently the 2nd World OER Congress in 2017 deepened UNESCO's dedication to OER.



#### **Creative Commons Licenses**

- Introduced in 2002
- Continuum of openness
- Allows for copyright holders, content creators to license for sharing
- Creates ways to make intellectual property shareable, remixable, and usable





## ISKME and Open

- Founded in 2002, at the same time as the Creative Commons licensed were released.
- Focus on researching how educators perform continuous improvement on curriculum over time.

Launched OER Commons in 2007 through funding from the Hewlett

Foundation.





#### **OER Commons**

- Launched in 2007 with funding from the Hewlett Foundation
- Close to 50,000 indexed OER records
- 270,000+ registered users



#### OER Commons and ISKME Services

- Ongoing social science-based research in the open education space
- Services to support state agencies, universities, and community colleges develop and support OER initiatives.



HUBS are sponsored community wings within the OER Commons Digital Library which include:



COLLECTIONS, where Hub administrators determine what is on the shelves of this wing of the library. Collections get created in two ways:

- 1. Bring in existing OER Commons Collections and Providers
- Create custom Hub Collections by tagging desired resources with a specific keyword that our librarians provide



GROUPS are the round tables where Hub members are gathering to curate, evaluate, and create resources.



IICROSITI



MICROSITES are custom branches of the OER Commons Digital Library










Microsites are comprehensive "branch libraries" administered by ISKME's partners. They can have describe resources using a custom taxonomy or descriptors, and have their own ecosystems of Collections, Groups, and Hubs.

  - Material Type
  - License
  - Source
  - User
  - Format
  - Educational Use
  - Language
  - Provider




## Finding OER: Search and Browse for Discovery

- Browse by:
  - Subject
  - Material Type
  - Provider
  - Curated Collections

Or, build on the work of others by reviewing existing Groups and Hubs!







#### **OER Commons Hubs**

- "Wings" in the OER Commons public library or within a partner Microsite
- Highlight the work of an institution, NGO, organization, system, or project
- Offer a view of selected, curated resources
- Create a space for collaboration and sharing, building community
- Allow for information sharing through videos, text, and announcements.
